Founded in 1995, the Wisconsin Environmental Initiative (WEI) works to improve the environment, economy and quality of Wisconsin through initiatives that promote responsible business practices, sound environmental policy, green building and water stewardship.

WEI has held many forums over the years, covering diverse topics such as: Wisconsin Green & Growing, Green Tier Advantage, Bio-economy, Green Jobs in the New Europe, Quality Urban Development, Energy Policy and Profit-Driven Environmental Management. World-class speakers, including renowned architect Bill McDonough, Ray Anderson, CEO of Interface and green business guru Joel Makower, have keynoted WEI's events and brought national and global perspectives to state concerns.

Among WEI's most successful program are Green Built Home, Travel Green Wisconsin and WEI's newest initiatives: Main Street Green and Clean Clear Waters.

Main Street Green



Main Street Green is WEI's newest initiative focused on cultivating, educating and supporting businesses that make a strong commitment to the environment. We work with Main Street businesses that are ready to move forward with more sustainable operations. These leading

"ecopreneurs" are implementing innovative "best practices" and technologies to benefit the community and environment.

Main Street Green was officially launched on Monroe Street in Madison, where the local merchants association and 26 businesses representing various retail, food and beverage, and service establishments are making a strong commitment to superior environmental performance.

In 2014, WEI worked with teams of UW Badger Volunteers to help participating businesses:

- Pursue energy efficiency goals.
- Incorporate water-saving strategies.
- Implement best practices in landscaping and related efforts to reduce storm water run-off.
- Shift their purchasing practices to more local and environmentally responsible choices.
- Educate their customers, employees and the public about actions they can take to reduce their environmental impact.
- WEI highlighted Main Street Green in several articles published by the WI State Journal, The Capital Times and the Dudgeon Monroe and Vilas Neighborhood Associations along with presentations to stakeholders at the Go Green event at Olbrich Gardens, Isthmus Green Day and the Edgewood College Sustainability Leadership Program.

Green Built Home



Green Built Home (GBH) is a national awardwinning building initiative that reviews and certifies new homes and remodeling projects that meet sustainable building and energy standards. Energy efficient, eco-friendly building projects are continuing to gain

momentum and WEI provides up-to-date information so you can make the most informed decisions. Since 1999, WEI has worked with stakeholders to Green Built Home certify more than 10,000 homes and multi-family units throughout the state. In 2014, WHEDA awarded Low Income Housing Tax Credits to 26 multifamily projects with 1,006 units statewide that will be built to WEI's Green Built Home standards.

Clean Clear Waters



Wisconsin lakes are the jewels of our state. A key challenge to protecting and enhancing our lakes is better management of stormwater runoff. Run-off causes soil erosion and can contain contaminants like motor oils and grease, pesticides, fertilizers, and deicing salt that is harmful to waterways.

Each of us can play an important role improving our lakes by implementing best practices in our landscaping, lawn care and related efforts to reduce run-off and become better environmental stewards. In February, WEI Executive Director, John Imes presented about Clean Clear Waters at the 11th Annual "Advancements in Stormwater and Erosion Control" conference hosted by Naseca Wisconsin. In May, John participated with Monona Mayor Bob Miller and other dignitaries at a groundbreaking event of Treysta on the Water, the first mixed-use development to achieve "Clean Clear Waters" certification.

Clean Clear Waters strives to bring awareness to the important role builders, developers and communities play in improving Wisconsin's



lakes by implementing best practices in erosion control, landscape conservation and storm water management. The Treysta on the Water mixed-use development will use landscape conservation and storm water management strategies that greatly exceed the requirements of Clean Clear Waters certification.

Wisconsin Green Business



Environmental responsibility requires more than just compliance with state and federal laws and regulations. Today, many Wisconsin companies are taking a comprehensive approach to integrate sustainability into their operations. However, this can be a daunting task and it calls

for a new way of thinking. WEI educates and is a leader on ways to help ease the transition towards resource efficient business strategy.

In 2014, Executive Director John Imes continued to serve as an advisor to the Wisconsin Academy of Sciences, Arts and Letters initiative that examines Wisconsin's dependence on fossil fuels and offers "pathways to progress" that support sustainable energy sources. John works on the Advisory Committee that developed: "Climate Forward: A New Road Map for Wisconsin's Climate and Energy Future". In addition to several guest columns and his participation at the WI Academy's Resilient Wisconsin Day, John also traveled to Washington DC to attend the National Blue-Green Alliance Green Jobs Conference, a White House event, and met with Congressman Mark Pocan, Senator Tammy Baldwin's Chief of Staff, and other colleagues to highlight the Road Map and ways we can implement the recommendations to achieve a green and growing Wisconsin.
